



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

# **COMBAT VETERANS MOTORCYCLE ASSOCIATION**

Honoring the memory of Veterans the last mile of the way! James A. Haley Veterans' Hospital Hosts the Last Mile

This practice originated at James A. Haley Veterans' Hospital (JAHVA) in Tampa, FL and aims to ensure that all Veterans receive a dignified burial. The Final Mile was first implemented by a team at the James A. Haley Veterans' Hospital in Tampa, FL. This practice gathers community members and Veterans to honor the lives and service of unclaimed Veterans. This Practice establishes a protocol that can be initiated when a Veteran passes with no known next of kin (NOK). Specifically, the Final Mile combines the efforts of your local VA facility's Decedent Affairs team with community support to provide memorial services for those Veterans that would otherwise receive little recognition upon their passing. With the help of VA facility staff and Veterans groups, such as the Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association® (CVMA®), a procession can be organized to ensure that Veterans without next of kin receive care and concern upon passing. Implementing this practice ensures that all Veterans cared for by your facility are honored at the end of their lives.

# **COMBAT VETERANS MOTORCYCLE ASSOCIATION**

It was an unforeseen encounter between a Tampa VA Medical Center worker and a funeral director that initiated a program that currently recognizes departed Veterans who have no one to recognize them as they progress to their final resting spot.

Final Salute: The Last Mile gives a motorcycle escort to the Florida National Cemetery for Veterans who die at Tampa and Bay Pines VA Medical Centers and who have no family to take their remains.

David Allen, a Tampa VA biomedical information systems expert and part of the Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association, had ventured outside for some new air when he went to the hospital loading dock earlier this year. When he spotted a hearse with a flag-draped coffin plainly noticeable inside, his interest got the best of him.

"I figured this should be someone important, so rather than going where I intended to go, I stepped down and went to address who I suspected was the driver." That individual wound up being the proprietor of Veterans Funeral Care. "We began talking and he said, No, this is an unclaimed Vet, and that moved me. He clarified that the Veteran had died and either had no family who would assert them or no family to take them."

The Final Voyage.

Allen discovered that Veterans pass away without family to take them several times per year at both Tampa and Bay Pines VA. At the point when that occurs, the clinic contracts Veterans Funeral Care to transport the Veteran's stays to Florida National Cemetery in Bushnell, Florida, more than 45 miles away, for a prompt internment with no military honors. Those honors normally should be mentioned by the family.

Allen, an Army Desert Shield/Desert Storm Veteran, has ridden with the Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association (CVMA) for a few years. He felt they could accomplish something to respect these Veterans. Thus, he addressed the association's official board and the funeral home administrators.

"We were sufficiently fortunate to have the option to sit down with both directors, and they totally cherished the thought," Allen said. "It was, for what reason didn't we realize this was going on? It truly comes down to nobody knew."

Official approaches are presently set up at both Tampa and Bay Pines VA recognizing Final Salute: The Last Mile as an official association between the medical clinics and the CVMA. The main escort at Tampa occurred in February 2019, and there have been eight more escort missions at Tampa and four at Bay Pines since then.

Presently, at whatever point a Veteran dies at the medical clinic with no family to assert the stays, either Allen or the Veteran Experience officer is informed. Allen starts the coordination process with his kindred CVMA individuals, decedent undertakings and the funeral home. The funeral home presently mentions military honors for every Veteran as well.

Then, the lady extended her hand and introduced herself as Kerri Thomas - though all her friends referred to her as 'Kat'. We shook and I ordered a cup of coffee. Talking about her recent experience on a Harley.



She had a bad motorcycle bug. Then I left for camp returning in time to tend to the fire in the wood stove. As days passed, we ran into each now and again. She was always cheerful, with


her dark curls and dark eyes. Whenever we met, Kat would always take the time to inquire after my wellbeing, genuinely saying, "Hi, darling, how have you been?" As the years progressed, we grew closer and soon it was 2022 and the weather was warming, prompting people to go for a spin on their motorcycles. On one such occasion, Kat was riding with a BACA member to Boise when they were abruptly rear-ended by an uninsured, unlicensed kid in a Mercedes, traveling at an excessive speed.



Kerri suffered severe head trauma, and other critical injuries. Her friend escaped with bruises and some scratches.. Miraculously, a special tactics air crew that was on their way back from training were able to rush her to the hospital, where her skull cap had to be surgically removed due to extreme swelling of the brain. This small, tight-knit military community heard about the accident fast. There were prayer sessions and fundraisers. Though I had no family connection to Kat, I was still crushed to hear of her condition and I paced and prayed for her speedy recovery. More than anything I wanted to know if she had an Advanced Directive. She did not, I

make decisions on a loved one's behalf without knowing what their wishes are. I have been reaching out to people, trying to find a legislator to accept the bill and present it to the House. Unfortunately, I've yet to get a response. Nevertheless, I am still fighting and am thrilled that I was able to find a platform for this message in Raked magazine - the collaborative efforts of which were inspired by Mark Wilson. I am profoundly grateful to him and his team for giving me this platform and am a resolute follower of their work. Riding is an exhilarating experience, and if you choose to partake in it, think hard before you ride. With your affairs in good order you can just focus on the peace and excitement of the road and the wind. I will name this law The Kat's Meow. I'll catch up on the playground! Hard Tail 2023 ... 



After spending 10-11 years on Wind Up Records in New York City with major acts like Creed, Evanescence, and Drowning Pool, Eric Durrance chose to move to Nashville. There, the label he was with offered him two options, either continue with rock as a solo artist, or venture into the country music industry, which the label promised to back him with. Eric Durrance took that leap of faith and here they are today, TRB, entertaining country-rock music lovers.

While in Nashville, Eric was presented with a magnificent chance and working with the yet-to-be-famous country music artist, Jake Owen, who he had a great relationship with, co-writing and recording songs together, with Eric sleeping on Jake's couch in Nashville.

When the label asked Eric whether he wanted to pursue rock or country music, Eric decided to go for the country genre. He felt an emotional connection to country music and his rural origins, so he happily chose Country. So, they traveled to Nashville and the label invested a large amount of money for setting up things, however the label failed to grasp the working method there, and as a result were unable to fund the project further.

Eric had already observed forewarned the label that the project was reaching a turning point and decided to return to his home in Tallahassee. During the very first weekend when he was back home, he was with his girlfriend and current wife and her best friend, who was married to his old guitar idol, Lex Vance.

They got together and Eric asked Lex what had been happening in his life. Lex

heard that Eric had left and come back to which Eric replied that he was done trying; he had been on the road in the business for more than twenty years, but it still had not worked out. To this, Lex proposed that they start a band; a group that could perform all the Top 40 songs, with Eric and Lex performing acoustic

At this suggestion, Eric suggested that they get a drummer as well, which is how Joe came in, and they further hired a bass player to be a part of the band. Soon enough, Eric was done with playing other people's songs and wanted to create his own music. This became a casual project, with them writing a song and deciding to launch it to the public to see how people responded.

Their success took them by surprise, with TBR producing a music video for it and this being when Eric understood he truly had a passion for music. Being back in Tallahassee, where it all began, they desired to take their project to the next level. This plan of theirs bore fruit, as they started getting invitations from everywhere, requesting them to perform.

One event that had a particularly significant impact on their band was the Florida Mud Bog, an annual festival where people get their heavy trucks and invest a lot of money to assess their performances. At this venue, the Redneck Yacht Club, there was an attendance of 20,000, leaving the team of TRB overwhelmed. Realizing that this was a great opportunity to promote their group, Eric conceived the idea to compose a song about the atmosphere of the Mud Bog, accompanied by a music video.

The song, Eric wrote entitled 'That's Country', ended up expressing the entire culture associated with the Mud Bog. In addition to this, they contacted Colt Ford from Average Joe Records and had him rap on the track, which he was extremely interested in working with TRB. They flew to Nashville and Colt agreed to be a part of the track. This was the first of many experiences that allowed them to achieve the success that they had envisioned.

find a replacement bassist, leading Eric to step in to fill the void. When Ben suggested that they try out Josh, the group gave him a shot, and they all soon realized he was the perfect addition to the team. The band still works with him to this day.

Then came the Coronavirus pandemic, and within a single week, 75 of their shows were cancelled, throwing the independent band into chaos. This left Eric searching for a day job to make ends

The four original members of Tobacco Rd Band, consisted of singer/songwriter Eric Durrance, lead guitarist Ben Castro, the original bass player Dale Shumate, and drummer Joe Markham. The current bass player is Josh Buckley, after Dale retired from his musical career and spent time with TRB to care for his elderly mother. Pre-COVID, the band was playing 150 to 200 shows annually, making them one of the most successful live acts country music fans have ever seen.

Before Josh Buckley, the band could not

meet and sustain his career in the music industry, a difficult shift for someone who had spent a lifetime in the music indus-

TRB was determined to make the best of it, however, and has been performing 3-4 nights a week to support themselves financially. With each gig, their notoriety for original music spreads farther and farther through word of mouth. On rare occasions they find themselves concerned with playing enough popular tunes to please the audience, their worries prove to be unfounded as people come to hear them for their unique music. Eric proudly states "It's a great feeling and something we'll keep striving to maintain."

Eric mentioned that songwriting has always been his main passion since entering the music industry. The songs of TRB are all written from his own experiences and the emotions that come with them. His music provides a sense of comfort and solace for people going through similar struggles, so that they do not feel like they are all alone.

It was an honor to speak with Eric, and we soon discovered we both had endured great losses in our lives. His golden heart shines through in his music, and it is



A later event in the band's history saw Durrance becoming the first artist to sign with Silvercreek Records, a record label based in Nashville, owned by the Nashville music veterans Stafond Seago and Steve Pope. But, due to various issues, the artist and label mutually decided on a severance, and Eric Durrance resumed recording under his own independent

label, Big Southern Entertainment.

Following the turn of the new decade, Durrance and the group further promoted their music through a number of shows and concerts in the Southern states. Finally, in January 2016, Tobacco Rd Band released their single "Jesus & Guns" on country radio stations in response to President Barack Obama's Executive Order on gun control, with the song having originally appeared on the EP "Where the Girls Are". In 2020 the band recorded and released their new independent album "Worth Fighting For" and is rocking their way into 2023 with shows booked including shows as supporting act for Koe Wetzel and LOCASH among other awesome artists, headlining festivals as well as playing a honky tonk or two along the way, as well as the 1st OCC Invitational Bike Show, the Honky Tonk Train is headed your way.

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










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

I feel safe that I can handle the bike safely. and it is stable for us both. I have had this bike for two years. I don't see myself ever going back to two wheels or riding another bike.


# What is your family dynamic now?







How has riding changed your life? All for the better, I love riding. I love the freedom the speed and most of all its quiet, don't like windshield's, music or fairings I just get on and go.



Charlie Bucket and I were traveling partners, we would travel from Denver to Chicago every year to visit my
